Oivind Lorentzen's Nine held a mere 0.7-point advantage over Joel Ronning's Catapult heading into the final day of competition at the J/70 North American Championship hosted by Edgewater Yacht Club in Cleveland, Ohio. Light winds permitted only one race, and *Nine* nailed it, earning a second-place finish (to *Catapult*'s 12th) to claim the 2019 title. Joined by Lucas Calabrese, Ian Coleman and Will Felder, Lorentzen tallied 26.3 net points in the 10-race series. 2016 J/70 World Champion Ronning captured the silver position with 31 points. John Brim's Rimette gained a third in the day's lone contest, pumping them up to third overall with 38 points. Team Vineyard Vines led by John and Molly Baxter closed the Championship with a bullet, giving them fourth place on a tiebreaker (over Brian Keane's Savasana) at 42 points. Kevin Morgan's Wild Child with crew Mike Sheehan, Caroline Sundman, Sarah Paisley and Mark Hassett topped the 13-boat

Corinthian division. Following them were Martin Johnsson's *Aquaholiks* and Charlie Pendleton's *Bad Hombres*.

"It's very exciting for me because I've been working at this now for a few years," beamed Lorentzen. "The level of competition makes it so rewarding. Having good crew makes all the difference in the world. The thanks really go to them." Although Lorentzen has sailed in the Great Lakes before, he's never done so in Cleveland. "The venue was a pleasure—the wind, the welcoming club. Hopefully we do it again."

Willem van Waay, racing on *Zaguero*, summarized the week's conditions in Cleveland, "15-25 knots, 72-degree fresh water, 5-8 foot waves, 80+ degrees out. San Francisco is awesome, but this place, this week, is at a different level. It's like God built a perfect playground for us!"



DAY ONE RECAP: Postcard conditions on Lake Erie greeted teams with a south breeze from 12-16 knots and gusts in the 20s, equaling perfect planing opportunities. Adding in sunny skies and temperatures in the 70s, everyone relished the three races to kick off the Championship. Lorentzen's team on *Nine* rocked all three contests to take the early advantage with 6 points, after posting a 1,2,3. The Baxters' *Team Vineyard Vines* started with a seven and added two bullets for 9 points and second place. Ronning's *Catapult* was only one notch behind the Baxters in third (scores of 5,3,2). Johnsson's *Aquaholiks* crew of Jorgen Johnsson, Lindsay Hernandez and August Hernandez had the advantage in the Corinthian division. Lorentzen's *Nine* launched the regatta with a bullet, followed by Brim's *Rimette* and Bruce Golison's *Midlife Crisis*. The Baxter family took the second and third victories, ahead of Lorentzen and Ronning in race two, who flipped spots in race three.



DAY TWO RECAP: There were gray skies in the morning until the sun peeked out with a NW breeze from 15-20 knots, gusts in the high 20s and monster waves. Teams completed two full-on races. Following a Redress hearing, Lorentzen's Nine kept a slight grip on their lead with 8.3 points (2.3, 3 on the day). It looked as though Ronning's *Catapult* had moved into first, however they held second place with 9 points (3,1 on Thursday). *Team Vineyard Vines* fell to third with two fives, totaling with 12 points overall. Brim's *Rimette* took a bullet for the day's first race, bringing them to fourth overall at 13 points. Following one tick behind

them was Golison's *Midlife Crisis*. Johnsson's *Aquaholiks* maintained his lead in the Corinthian Division. Ronning, who won the day's final contest, said, "Worlds' swells were very vertical while the swells here are wide and further apart, which led to an amazing downwind. You felt like you were on a cliff floating above the wave sometimes looking 7 feet down. It was a cool experience." *Rosebud*'s Pamela Rose said she is excited to be one of two women skippers at the Championship, "Very exciting, very similar conditions from the Worlds' experience in 2018. It was exhilarating racing; we clocked 20 going downwind."

DAY THREE RECAP: Solid breeze continued Friday, although from the South, meaning flatter water. Four epic races went in the books, bringing the total to nine. Lorentzen's *Nine* and Ronning's *Catapult* played chutes and ladders for the top two positions, with ultimately Lorentzen holding the overall lead, albeit by less than one single point (24.3 to 25). *Nine* suffered an 18 in the day's first race, which became their discard, however *Catapult*'s throw-out was only a sixth. Temperatures reached the low 80s in Northeast Ohio, with partly sunny skies and a beautiful South wind between 12-15 knots. Morgan's Wild Child took control of the 13boat Corinthian division. Ronning's Catapult handily took Friday's opening match, with Keane's Savasana and Brazil's Haroldo Solberg on Viking getting in on the action. Lorentzen's Nine then took their turn at the front of the pack in the next contest, ahead of Rose's Rosebud and Keane in third this time. Solberg's Viking kept up their solid day by winning race eight, as Keane was again near the top in second, chased by Brim's Rimette. Following Golison's Midlife Crisis to shore after the final duel were Lorentzen and James Prendergast.

The J/70 World Championship Returns to California July 26 through August 1, 2020

Recognized by its peers as one of the top 20 yacht clubs in the United States, our Club will be rolling out the "red carpet" for competitors, support teams and their families, as one might expect from the entertainment capital of the world.

The J/70 Class is the latest in a long list of one-design boats that have held a major Championship in our waters. As a three-time winner of US Sailing's St. Petersburg Trophy for "Excellence in Race Management," our members and management are confident



in our ability to deliver to your Class the exceptional on-the-water racing and warm shoreside hospitality for which we have been recognized in the past.

This is an invitational regatta, with elite teams representing more than 20 countries having qualified under the J/70 World Championship Qualifying System.

2019 J/70 Australian Championships Regatta

The Cruising Yacht Club of Australia (CYCA), home of the famous Sydney to Hobart offshore race, hosted the J/70 Australian Championship on Sydney Harbour on the weekend of October 19 and 20. A strong shifty westerly wind blowing from the land provided tough conditions on day one, with gusts over 30 knots and a particularly challenging top mark set in a leeward bay with very fluky winds. Day two saw a steadier 10 to 12 knot southeast wind with some very close racing throughout the fleet. Helped by off-season racing at the J/70 Worlds in Torquay, the Juno team (Reg Lord, Ben Lamb, Murray Jones, Tom Grimes) racing for the CYCA won each race to claim the title for the third consecutive year. Second overall and first Corinthian was James helmed by Tim Ryan, also from the CYCA. Third was Jabberwocky (Middle Harbour YC), helmed by Australian Class President Andrew Tompson with expert trimmer Noel Drennan on main.

Another newcomer, and fourth overall, was Michael Nash from RSYS who traded his Etchells for *Maybe J*. Nash commented that, "The J/70 is a great boat for mixed sailing as the main is manageable for anyone. Olga (Skatkova) said just yesterday that she was surprised she had no problems playing the spinnaker on Saturday where winds were gusting over 30 knots." Ray Carless of *Junior* commented, "The winds and harbour conditions were at times challenging, but overall it was an excellent event with great sportsmanship, camaraderie and, most of all, fun J/70 sailing."

Also, a special mention to the teams *Jumpin' Jack Flash* and *Spike* who travelled 1,000kms from Victoria to compete.

The 2020 Nationals are scheduled to take place over Easter, hosted by Blairgowrie Yacht Squadron on Port Philip Bay in Melbourne, Victoria.

Proposed Class Rules Changes

The International Technical Committee has proposed a set of Class Rules changes for 2020. The vast majority of these changes are minor wording changes that have been identified over the past several years as areas for clarification, and none of the proposed changes will alter the way that J/70s are sailed.

The text of the 2020 Rules Change proposals can be found at the International J/70 Class Association website (http://j70ica.org/class-officerules/). Under the Class' bylaws, they will be voted on at the Annual General Meeting on December 11, 2019, and thereafter be submitted for approval by World Sailing. I expect they will go into effect in early 2020.

are to be secured, which should ease everyone's ability to comply with the tension requirements as well as make it easier to

requirements as well as make it easier to enforce the tension requirements. Experience has shown that the most effective way to prevent droop hiking (prohibited by the Class Rules) is to ensure that lifelines are taut.

A change to the way the safety lines (lifelines)

A few of the highlights of

the Proposals are:

A clarification in language to specify that all boats—regardless of type of engine—must carry a suitable fire extinguisher. This change will greatly improve safety practices as well as eliminate a difference in required equipment between boats with gas versus electric outboards.

The creation of a new—entirely optional— "One-Pro Division" for scoring and awards. Many Class members have discussed experimenting with one-pro limitations, and this new division (which will work much the same as the Corinthian Division) will allow event organizers to encourage participation by offering awards for boats with only one pro aboard.

Again, most of the rest of the changes—there are 24 in all—are minor language alterations to provide more consistency and clarity and to better align the Class Rules with the J/70 Building Specification, the Racing Rules of Sailing, the Equipment Rules of Sailing and with existing Class intent and practice.

2019 NORTH AMERICANS REPORT

At the 2019 North Americans at Edgewater Yacht Club in Cleveland, OH, your Technical Committee conducted inspections of both boats and sails, as well as on-water inspections. We again utilized the online Class Rules Compliance Declaration Form and found that it worked well to streamline the process. A huge thanks to David McNabb, the Event Technical Chair, and all the volunteers at Edgewater YC for making the inspection system run so smoothly.

A couple compliance reminders that emerged from Cleveland:

MAINSHEET STROPS:

The J/70 Building Specification has a maximum and minimum length for the strop that connects the boom to the mainsheet purchase. If you have replaced your stock strop, confirm that yours will fall between the minimum and maximum length. The current Building Specification can be found with the other J/70 Class Rules: http://j70ica.org/class-office-rules/

KEEL WEDGES:

As a reminder, keel wedges <u>may not</u> be shortened, their position altered or otherwise tampered with without the express permission of J/Boats and the International Technical Committee. If you believe (or someone tells you) that your boat is 'flawed,' your recourse is to contact the Class and J/Boats for further instructions, not to have the wedges altered to 'correct a flaw.' Note that wedges will be an inspection emphasis in 2020.

LOOKING AHEAD TO 2020

The Technical Committee will be present at the J/70 Midwinters in Miami, the European Championship in Copenhagen, the Corinthian Nationals in Marblehead, the Worlds in Los Angeles, and the North Americans in Toronto. We continue to refine our techniques and processes and look forward to making Rules compliance as easy and seamless as possible on our members, while achieving the Class' intended high level of enforcement.

As always, I am proud to serve as your Technical Chair and am honored to work with the talented members of the IJ70CA Technical Committee to make our Class even better. Turkey Report

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San Francisco/Annapolis YC Team Wins Battle at J/70 U.S. Youth National Championship

Eleven teams vied for the third annual J/70 U.S. Youth National Championship, hosted by St. Petersburg Yacht Club in St. Petersburg, FL from November 22-24. The weekend was dominated by the teams of San Francisco Yacht Club/Annapolis Yacht Club, led by James Golden, and Cal Maritime, led by Kyle Collins. Although they were tied on points heading into the 11th and final battle, it was Golden's team who earned the victory by four points, with Luke Koerschner, Hannah Sellers and Caleb Yoslov. They ended with 23 points to Collins' 27. Golden and Koerschner are from Annapolis YC; Sellers and Yoslov from San Francisco YC. The local St. Petersburg Yacht Club squad, led Heather Kerns, took third with 30 points. Light winds prevented racing on Friday, but conditions allowed all 11 intended races to be completed over the next two days.

The goal of this event is to help develop and build leading-edge junior keelboat sailing programs across America. Youth teams (representing CA, CT, FL, GA, MA, MD, MI, NJ and SC) competed on provided J/70s with class sails. Boats were identically rigged and tuned at base settings recommended by the sailmaker. As teams gathered on Thursday for a practice race, local J/70 expert Marty Kullman conducted on-water coaching and classroom lessons at SPYC. Each youth team was permitted up to five crew, age 20 or younger as of December 31, 2019.

Nordic Report



When we summarize the 2019 J/70 season in the Nordics, it has been a great year—a good selection of regattas in both fleet and sprint racing spread over the four Nordic countries. For the major fleet racing regattas, we, this year, had 99 different entries. This means the fleet continues to grow (in 2018 it was 82).

For the fourth year, the common Nordic series Grundig Sailing Cup was carried out. The Grundig Sailing Cup contained seven regattas in Norway, Sweden and Denmark and led to the final in Færøsund in Denmark. From each regatta, the number one and number two qualified for the final. To this, a number of wildcards where invited, and one of them was the defending 2018 Grundig Sailing Cup Champion Jacob Nikolajsen. A majority of the qualification regattas is in fleet racing with own boats. But the final in Færøsund was sailed in sprint format with the boats from the Danish Sailing League. And for the second year in a row, we had the Dane Jacob Nikolajsen at the top of the podium with a check worth 2000 Euro in Grundig products.

There have been four National Championships (Norway, Finland, Sweden and Denmark) during the season, where the one in Hankø in Norway also was the Nordic Championship. To this regatta, 33 J/70s met up in the beautiful area of Hankø for racing in really nice conditions in the Oslo Fjord. Fredrik Hedlund, the Swede living in Switzerland but racing under a Norwegian flag and with a Norwegian crew, became the Champion followed by *Wolfpack Racing*, helmed by Thomas Nilsson (NOR), and *Alandia Sailing Team*, helmed by Daniel Mattsson (FIN).

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The Finnish Championship was hosted by Åländska SS in Mariehamn at Åland. Finland is the youngest J/70 country in the area with a smaller fleet, but a really competitive one. Here *Alandia Sailing Team* with Daniel Mattson (FIN) won the first Finnish Championship ever, followed by Henrik Lundberg (FIN) and Tomas Skålen (SWE). This regatta was also a warm-up for the Nordic Championship in 2020 which will be at the same venue 21-24 of May.

The Swedish Championship in mid-August was organized by Karlstad Sailclub and was sailed in Lake Vättern with 35 J/70s at the starting line. The regatta was sailed in rather tough conditions with a lot of wind and choppy waves. In these conditions, the defending 2018 Champion and the winner of the Finnish Nationals, *Alandia Sailing Team* with Daniel Mattsson (FIN) at the helm, were outstanding and became the 2019 Swedish Champion, followed by Magne Klann (NOR) and Hemming Hanses (FIN). At fourth place, we had the best Swede, Magnus Tyreman.

J/70 Dutch Championship at Braassemermeer

We had a record 24 boats at our Nationals from 1-3 November in the Netherlands. Teams from four countries were competing in challenging conditions on Lake Braassem, close to Amsterdam.

The Race Committee of Yacht Club Braassem did an excellent job giving us 12 races over 2 ¹/₂ days in very different wind conditions. We had no generals recalls, which was primarily due to a fantastic start line and really good race management. Therefore, there were no delays or time wasted between races and starts. All sailors appreciated this professional race management.

Friday started with medium wind conditions from a southerly direction, and it seemed that the left side of race course was slightly favored. Teams sticking to this game plan made some good results, and after one day, Team PRO4U (Sweden) was leading before Team Henrilloyd (skipper John den Engelsman).

The second day, we had more challenging conditions. The weather forecast was predicting 22-32 knots of wind, and the J/70 is always fun to sail in these reveling conditions. With top speeds of 21.6 knots, Team GER1377 won the speed prize of this day. Really big smiles on all crew members' faces on every boat after this race day!

The foreign teams proved to be excellent competitors, with the Swedish team

(SWE 786) with Patrik Forsgren as helmsman still leading after the first two days of the regatta. And Team GER 13 with skipper Gordon Nickel in second position.

The last day of the regatta proved to be totally different. The wind was dying, and the Race Committee gave us four good races in 4-8 knots of wind. The Swedish team started with an OCS, and this proved to be expensive. The German team (Gordon Nickel) was very solid and scored top 10 results also in this very light wind conditions. The last race was abandoned in a dying breeze of 2 knots. The Race Committee proved once more to make proper decision. GER13 with Gordon Nickel from Cuxhaven finished at the top of the ranking and are winners of the Dutch national title.

Team NED 936 (team Maarten Jamin) also sailed a fantastic Championship and just passed the Swedes by one point, climbing the ladder for second position. Team Patrik Forsgren finished third, and Team NED1117 finished just outside the medals in the fourth spot.

There was a great prize ceremony every day including free drinks and Dutch 'Bitterballen' after racing and sailors' dinner at the club. The social was well organized by the Dutch Class. This was a great finishing of a fantastic sailing year 2019. Thanks to all sailors who showed up at this event.

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
