
Ducasse Family Crowned 2021 J/70 South American Champions

Hosted by the Cofradía Náutica del Pacífico in Algarrobo,
Valparaiso Chile, the 2021 edition of the J/70 South American
Championship will go down as an epic experience for the 22 teams participating from across the continent: Chile, Brazil, Argentina and Uruguay. After a challenging 12-race series offshore of the resort of Algarrobo, the PRO and Race Committee team ensured the sailors had fair, fast sailing over the four-days.

Winning was Rodrigo Ducasse and his family team on *Tsunami*. They started the regatta with four straight deuces to lead the Championship by a considerable margin.

After a few hiccups in the middle of the regatta, they closed with a strong 3-3-1-4-1 to win with 27 points net. While posting four bullets in their overall scoreline, Pablo Herman's New Wave team also had a first race Black Flag and closing three races of 5-6-10. They earned the silver medal with 41 points net. The final step on the podium went to Diego Gonzalez's Andare Facile with 56 points net. Opening up with a 1-1-3 on the first day (leading the regatta), the Andare Facile crew fell off but still took the bronze. The balance of the top five was Vernon Robert's Morenita in fourth with 60 points net and Alberto Guarischi's *Three Musketeers* team from Brazil with 69 points net in fifth place. Top Women's Skipper Award went to Pipa Cisternas on *Uroboro* from Chile, finishing eighth overall in the competitive fleet.

Fernando Perez Ontiveros' Black Mamba topped 62 other boats to claim the title of 2022 J/70 Midwinter Champion. The team from Mexico, including Gonçalo Almeida, Bernardo Freitas and River Paquin, retired from the eighth and final race on Sunday, February 6 as they had the title locked up at Davis Island Yacht Club in Tampa, Florida USA. They finished with 38 net points, four better than Brian Keane's Savasana. Richard Witzel's Rowdy placed third with 46 net points.

In the Corinthian Division, Francisco Van Avermaete's *Juicy* (with Geronimo Galvan, Francisco Bellochio and Trinidad Silva) from Argentina topped the 28-boat group, ahead of American Bob Willis' *Rip Rullah* and Swedish Filip Engelbert's *Charter*. *USA1516*, with Dave Kerr, Lee Sackett, Geoff Becker and Tom Sessions, bested the seven-boat OnePro group. Rounding out that top three were Mark Gorman's *Pazzi* and Peter Barrett's *Reset*.

Black Mamba's River Paquin summarized, "We had really good starts, going off the line very fast, setting up for that first beat trying to get to the top mark in first. We put in a lot of practice and sailed in all sorts of conditions before this event. We knew how to change







gears quickly. Downwinds, we felt a little sticky, but we kept our position."

Juicy's Francisco Bellochio spoke about the conditions, stating they were "kind of tricky, shifty, right, left...pretty fun! On Saturday, we did top 10 in the first race. Second one, we got stuck at the starting line with a few

boats, but in the third one, we pulled another top 10."

Day One recap: A postcard day on Tampa Bay delighted the 63 teams. Under blue skies with temperatures in the 80s, winds started at 8-10 knots, then decreased briefly during a mid-day shift before increasing to 14-16 knots for the second half of the day. Taking an early advantage was David Jannetti's Very Odd with crew Travis Odenbach, Kris Werner and Terry Hutchinson, who tallied 15 points (4,7,1,3). Perez Ontivero's Black Mamba held second place with 24 points. Following were Bruno Pasquinelli's Stampede and Robert Hughes' Heartbreaker tied at 27 points. More than half of the fleet was competing in either the Corinthian or One-Pro divisions. Van Avermaete's Juicy had the lead among the amateur teams, and USA1516, led by Kerr/



Sackett, was atop the One-Pro group. Friday's race winners were John and Molly Baxter's *Team Vineyard Vines*, Pasquinelli's *Stampede*, Jannetti's *Very Odd* and Witzel's *Rowdy*.

Day Two recap: The temperature dropped, but the winds stayed solid in the low-teens, allowing another three races on Saturday. Perez Ontiveros' Black Mamba posted a 1,4,9 on the day to leapfrog into first place with 26

net points (discarding a 12). Day one leader Jannetti's *Very Odd* slipped to second place on the heels of 4,12,21, giving them 31 net points. Keane's *Savasana* won the day with a 3,6,3, and his 36 net points moved him into the bronze position. In the Corinthian Division, Van Avermaete's *Juicy* maintained the lead among the amateur teams, and *USA1516*, led by Kerr/Sackett, stayed atop the One-Pro group. Saturday's race winners



were Perez Ontiveros' *Black Mamba*, Kerr & Sackett's *USA1516* and the Baxter's *Team Vineyard Vines*. Following racing on Friday

and Saturday, sailors gathered at DIYC for debriefs with industry leaders and enjoyed complimentary beverages and snacks.

The schedule of races and social events will allow competitors to do a great regatta and discover a nice area in the south of France. J/70 INTERNATIONAL TECHNICAL COMMITTEE REPORT

International Technical Chair USA 487 *Escape*

This has been an extremely busy few months "behind the scenes" for your Technical Committee.

New Rules for 2022!

First, we are happy to announce that a revised set of J/70 Class Rules and J/70 Building Specifications have been published and are now effective.

For the 2022 cycle, we worked with World Sailing to incorporate 22 Rules changes—though virtually all of these are clarifications and wording changes that do not change anything substantive about the Rules.

There are, however, two important changes (and I think improvements!) that I want to call Class members' attention to:

1. The jib (headsail) halyard fine tune system may have a purchase of up to 8:1

New for 2022 is CR F.4.2 (Table), which sets out the Rules related to purchase systems on the boat. Prior to 2022, these were found in the J/70 Building Specifications—they've been moved to the CRs for clarity and to potentially allow more optionality going forward.

In particular, the Headsail Halyard Fine Tune may now have a purchase from 4:1 (minimum) to 8:1 (maximum). This change was made because of Class members' suggestions: for some teams, increasing purchase will make adjusting this halyard while sailing upwind easier and smoother. Again, any increase in purchase is entirely optional, and the minimum diameter of the control line remains 6mm.

The gennaker halyard adjustment may now incorporate two cleats.

Many of us who have sailed J/70s in windy, gusty conditions know that on occasion the gennaker halyard can "pop" out of the cam cleat and release—often resulting in a wipeout. Many Class members have suggested that we follow the lead of other small keelboats and allow a second cam cleat to be attached to the system, for use in windy conditions. See the image Below for an example.



By arranging the second cam cleat perpendicular to the primary, it can be used for a more secure fastening in high winds, while still allowing quick and easy release of the halyard when needed.

Looking Ahead

The Technical Committee will be present at the J/70 US Corinthian Nationals in Cleveland, Ohio this June, the J/70 European Championship in Hyeres, France in September, the J/70 North American Championship in Toronto, Canada in September and the J/70 World Championship in Monaco in October. We continue to refine our techniques and processes and look forward to making Rules compliance as easy and seamless as possible on our members, while achieving the Class' reputation for a high level of enforcement.

As always, I am proud to serve as your Technical Chair and am honored to work with the talented members of the IJ70CA Technical Committee to make our Class even better. We are always looking for volunteers to become Class Measurers and members of the national Technical Committees.

J/70 CLASS UPDATE -WINTER 2022

Quantum Pro-Laghi's Carlo Fracassoli provides an update on J/70 sail testing in Europe and preparing for the World Championship later this year. Carlo has been instrumental in the sail design and testing process and is one of Quantum's top European J/70 Class experts.

With the World Championship hosted in Monaco, 2022 will be an important year for the European J/70 Classes. Approximately 90 boats from countries around the world are expected at the October regatta. To help us prepare, we're focused during the winter regattas on dialing in the Quantum sail designs and updating our J/70 tuning guide. Knowing that Monaco will likely bring light wind and wavy conditions, we're working on a new, more powerful jib designed for these conditions. Our goal is to have a new sail ready for the first event of the Italian circuit in Punta Ala.

The 2021 season brought us great success like the Italian circuit win and a fourth place finish at the European Championship in Copenhagen. While we're pretty happy with our sails' performance so far, we'd like even better sails for the Worlds, so our European team of expert sailmakers, sailors, designers and coaches are testing new materials and new layouts that will improve not only our 2022 performance but also better suit the needs of our customers.


Quantum Rochester's Travis Odenbach discusses competition in the US and how the 2022 season is progressing thus far. Travis is Quantum's coordinator for the J/70 Class and competes regularly in winter series events and Class Championships.

2022 has been a big year so far in the J/70 Class. The US now has two popular winter series: the Bacardi Winter Series in Miami, Florida and another hosted by Davis Island Yacht Club in Tampa, Florida. In January, J/70 sailors were able to return to the waters of Key West at the Key West Race Week reboot, now called the Southernmost Regatta. Davis Island Yacht Club has had the most success this year with over 60 boats competing at each event. It also hosted the J/70 Midwinter Championship in which 63 boats competed. Everyone is enjoying the different racing opportunities this Class offers, including me. I've been able to sail each event this year, and it seems like the time in the boat and on the water is starting to pay off.

Over the past few years, Quantum has been refining its J/70 sail designs and tuning guide. In this pursuit, I've found – no surprise – that the more time we spend on the water, the more we understand the sails, learn the nuances of the boat and grow as a team. Our goal is to learn something every time we sail.

And there's always more to learn, whether it's a certain weather system at a venue, the modes in different conditions or communicating with new crew. If you're looking to improve your skills, spend more time on the water. If your schedule allows, arrive a day or two early to an event and practice jibes, going to wing, starting drills, and, most importantly, communicating with your team. So much of what we do is repetition and muscle memory. The more you practice, the more things become second nature.

The 2022 season offers many great regattas hosted in some awesome venues. I know everyone is itching to get out and sail after limited competition the last two years. Take advantage of the great venues and the expertise in the J/70 Class to learn as much as possible. See you all on the water soon!
